The foundation of human development must be the establishment of good character.

The following eleven classes will help your child develop some basic skills in good conduct.

Each class teaches one virtue using teachings from the Baha'i Faith.

Each class defines what the virtue is, why we should practice it and how we can practice it.

Each class includes: prayer, singing, a story, snack, arts and crafts and a game.

Homework is given to practice new skills and deepen comprehension throughout the week.

The goal of these classes is to awaken spiritual qualities latent within each child. To help each child radiate with good character.

Parents are welcome to watch or participate in class.
